Churches Together in the nations

Churches Together in England (CTE) was set up in 1990 as a fresh network of relationships. Prior to this there had been no ecumenical body specifically for England. CTE's responsibilities include developing ecumenical, inter-church relationships within England, particularly supporting local groups, ecumenical partnerships and County/Intermediate Bodies, women's issues, and youth matters. The early years of CTE were wisely guided by its first General Secretary, Canon Martin Reardon, who died in January 2005.

There are bodies parallel to CTE in Wales (CYTUN) and Scotland (ACTS). The Irish Council of Churches fulfils a similar role.

The Churches in the four nations and the Republic of Ireland do not have identical boundaries: some have a presence in one nation, some in two, some in three or four; several Churches transcend the boundary between Northern Ireland and the Republic.

Much thought in 2005 went into seeking a structure which honours the distinctiveness of each nation (and jurisdiction) whilst recognising that many Churches cross the national boundaries in their governance, loyalty and perception. The search was also for a way of ecumenical relating which was flexible and economical.

A re-framed Churches Together in Britain and Ireland, to be regarded as an agency of the national bodies such as Churches Together in England, comes into being in 2006. The national bodies themselves aim to work more closely and to share expertise and opportunity. This should mean that CTE is better equipped to support inter-faith work, social responsibility concerns and public affairs, the regional agenda, international concerns and so on.

The Free Churches and Churches Together

Most Member Churches of the Free Churches Group are also members of CTE. Since 2001 there has been a close partnership between CTE and the Free Churches Group, which has led to joint employment, administration and accommodation, and better use of resources.

Churches Together in Counties/Dioceses/Districts

'Intermediate' ecumenical bodies are supported and encouraged by CTE. They, and their ecumenical development officers, are completely autonomous.

The Presidents of Churches Together in England

The four Presidents of Churches Together in England are Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor (2000), Archbishop Rowan Williams (December 2002), Revd David Coffey (March 2003) and Bishop Nathan Hovhannisian (January 2006). They meet regularly with the General Secretary.

The Presidents are committed:

- ✓ to develop their mutual friendship and support
- to pray, study and work together for the unity and mission of the Church
- ✓ to consult together on issues for the common good
- ✓ to promote justice, integrity and peace
- to speak with one voice to give common witness to Jesus Christ, as far as they are able.

Governance of Churches Together in England

Churches Together in England is an Incorporated Charitable Company Limited by Guarantee (Company Registered No. 5354231, Charity Registered No. 110782). It is the successor to an unincorporated body of the same name. The Chairman of the Trustees (Directors) is Revd Peter Whittaker; the members of the Company are the Churches (i.e, denominations and alliances of churches) and representatives of the Forum, regional groupings and Bodies in Association.

The Churches Together in England Forum

A residential Forum is held every three years. 300 representatives of national Churches, intermediate and local ecumenical bodies attend, to review the life of the Churches and provide guidance for future co-operation and impetus for future commitment. The Moderator of the Forum is Revd John Rackley; Val Potter is Deputy Moderator. The Forum in May 2006 will have the theme *The glory of God... human beings fully alive*.

Finance

CTE's work is mostly financed by its Member Churches, with a small proportion from Intermediate Bodies. Work on behalf of the Free Churches Group is covered by funds from the Free Church Federal Council (Inc). Money comes from the Department of Health towards the cost of Health Care Chaplaincy work, and from the Department for Education and Skills for youth work. The Jerusalem Trust generously supports the **set all free** Project and the work of the Education Officer.
